Matthew 6:25-34 Worry or Trust

Introduction:

Matthew records a major topic in the life of the believer. He deals with this question: Are you free from worry? There is an old cliché, "if you're worrying, you're not trusting: and if you're trusting, you're not worrying." That is literally true and it is a proper restatement of Christ's warning that you cannot serve God and worry. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding." Prov. 3:5 (Isa. 12:2)

I. Stop Worrying

- A. Satan's desire to immobilize us II Cor. 2:11
 - 1. Worry has a future tense about it v.34; Phil. 4:5,6
 - 2. Today's quota John 11:8-10
 - 1. There are twelve hours in a day John 11:8-11

B. Threefold Emphasis:

- 1. Stop being anxious for your life Greek word for "Life" is "soul" v.25
- 2. Stop worrying about what you eat -v.31
- 3. Stop worrying about tomorrow v.34

C. Jesus expounds:

- 1. It's impossible to be a slave to both God and mammon. (previous context)
- 2. As important as the basics are they are not the most important things in life v. 25
- 3. Illustrates how the creation works v. 26
- D. The folly of worry -v.27; Psa. 39:5
- E. Clothing illustrated v. 28-30

II. Start Trusting

- A. Our faith should be great rather than small
 - 1. Look at the evidence, Jesus never teaches blind faith.
 - 2. The dry grass What is Jesus teaching here?
- B. What makes our faith grow? Turn To: Luke 17:1-6
 - 1. Don't cause a new believer to stumble.
 - 2. Be ready to forgive your brother.

Conclusion:

- 1. We must seek. That is our first priority.
- 2. We must obey. The Kingdom of God has rules.
- 3. We must understand. That the righteousness we are seeking is not our own.
- 4. Finally: "Therefore" Worry must always be deferred. Today's troubles must be dealt with.
